Huckster Calls It Quits

The silver-haired "dean" of Consumers Public Power district's sales corps has retired. Frank E. Parkins, 66, a merchandising huckster for some 40 years, made his last formal "pitch" as a CPPD'er on November 21—his retirement day.

A native of Mark Twain's hometown of Hannibal, Mo., Frank's selling career was concluded with an 18-year stint as CPPD's sales supervisor for the 11-county O'Neill district.

Prior to that, the song-writing he's got four on records and an oldtimer held a similar position at O'Neill for Interstate Power company before Consumers purchased Interstate property. Long before that turn of events the one-time professional dancer was in sales

work for the Utah Light & Power company, Nebraska Power company at Omaha, and for an electric equipment firm.

And you can be sure that the grandkiddies know such songs as: "Be There, Baby," "Hi Honey Baby, Baby," "Bad and Bold" and "Rockin' My Rock-A-By Baby." Those are Frank's four songs now on records and making the rounds on disc jockey's turntables at radio stations throughout the nation.

Frank, who has been "dabbling" in song-writing for years and who recently won first place in a national song writing contest sponsored by a music and record organization, is a realist when it comes to his future in the song-writing business. If one of his current numbers becomes a "hit" he's "in". If not, Frank will continue with his hobby which now covers more years than he cares to remember. His current records

mark an all-time high insofar as song-writing progress is concerned. The well-liked, dapper-dressed Frank took time recently to flip back the pages of history to recall some of the highlights of his life. Frank started working at the age of 14 as an apprentice electrician with the Union Pacific railroad at Omaha after attending Creighton Prep in Omaha.

Also, dancing professionally in Utah and Wyoming at various "big time" social functions and how Ruth was equally as fine a professional performer as a concert pianist. But they became domestic for Nebraska and Frank's favorite yearning for earnings—being a huckster of electrical appliances.

All this grand and glorious past hit a climax at O'Neill on Thursday evening, November 13, when O'Neill district employees and some of Frank's friends from other CPPD posts gathered for a retirement dinner party and dance. Parkins helped found the O'Neill Community Concerts association and served as its president.
