Smith-Kemper Rites in Kansas Church

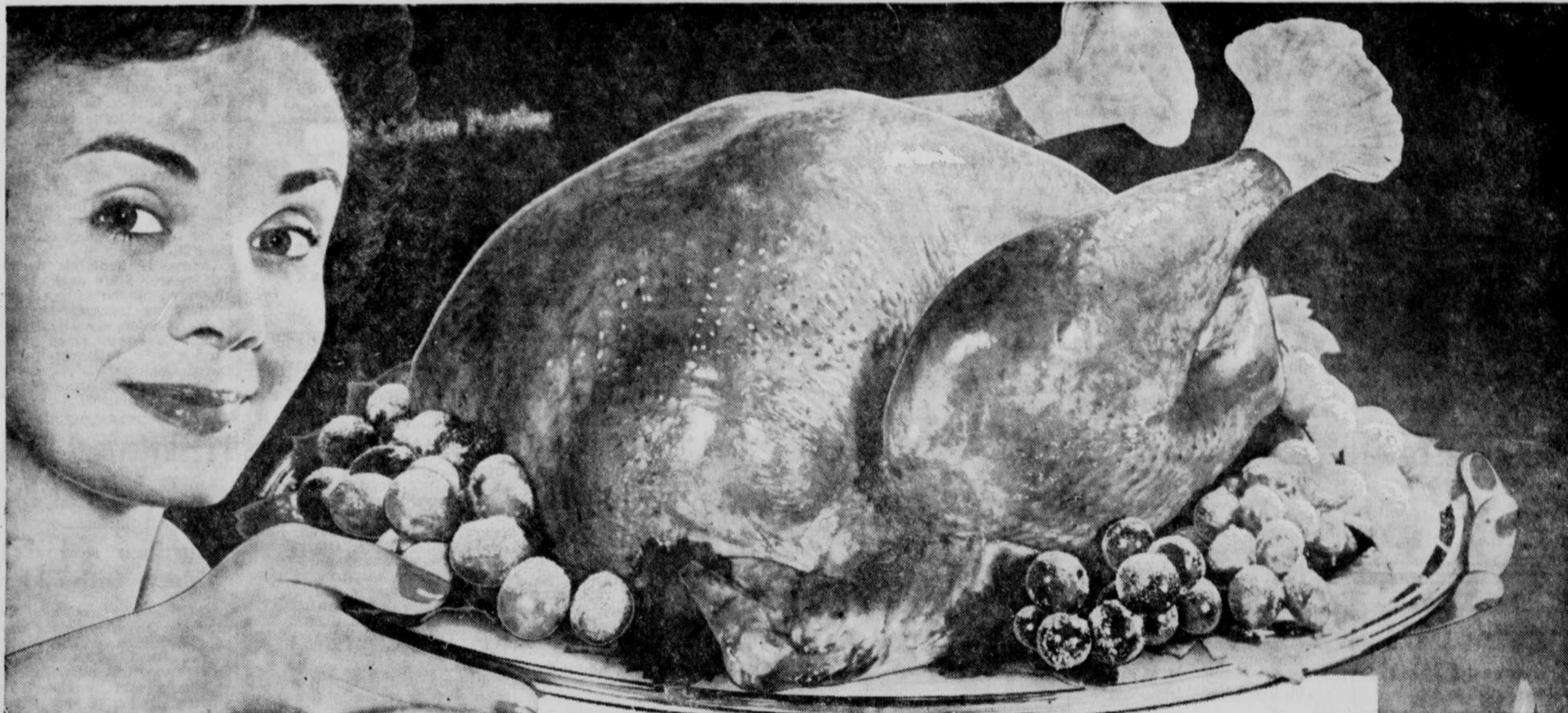
