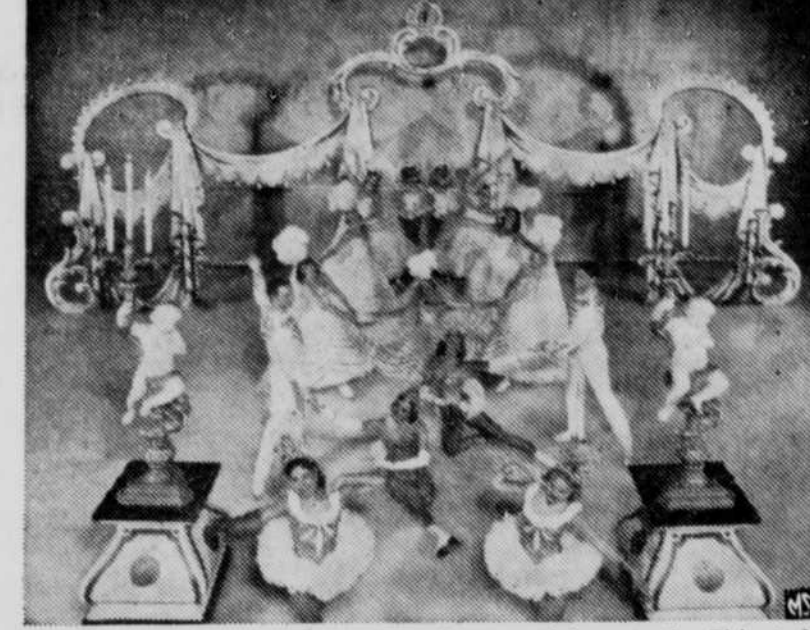
**Courthouse Gals Hold Yule Party**
