Bring Christmas To Your Table Settings

For an extra touch of holiday spirit, bring Christmas color and gaiety to your table set-tings. Bright "custom-made" centerpieces and decorations add so much to holiday decor, but need not be expensive.

For dinners and parties, you can make colorful candelabra very readily. Your local five-and-ten cent store carries all the necessary materials.

These gay candelabra were made with styrene foam, artificial leaves and berries. To make them, first hollow out a place for the candle in the center of the styrene base. Then secure the leaves and berries around the candle with florist's wire. Since the styrene base is soft, stems and wire can be pushed in with the fingers.

You can use almost anything as containers for your candelabra. Here they are set in bright enameled stainless steel party bowls, although a flat dish might do just as well.
