ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

That, at a special meeting of the stockholders duly called and held on this 26th day of December, 1958, pursuant to the lawful notice thereof duly given, the Articles of Incorporation of said bank, upon resolution regularly made and accepted, were amended by striking out all of the Articles of Incorporation of said bank heretofore provided and existing and by adopting in place thereof the following Amended Articles:

ARTICLE I. The name of this corporation shall be FARMERS STATE BANK.
ARTICLE II. The principal place of business of this corporation shall be Ewing, County of Holt, State of Nebraska.

ARTICLE III. This corporation is formed to transact a commercial banking business as provided by the laws of Nebraska.
ARTICLE IV. The authorized capital stock of this corporation shall be \$75,000.00 of which \$50,000.00 has been paid in. It is represented by shares of the par value of \$100.00 each.

ARTICLE V. This corporation commenced business on the 1st day of September, 1927, or as soon thereafter as authorized by the Department of Banking of the State of Nebraska and shall have perpetual existence.

ARTICLE VI. The affairs of this corporation shall be managed by a Board of Directors consisting of no less than three nor more than 15 shareholders whose term of office shall be for one year or until their successors are elected and qualified. The Board of Directors shall elect from its number a president, a vice-president and a secretary. The Board of Directors shall select annually a cashier and such additional officers and employees as are needed to conduct the business of the corporation. By-laws for the control of the corporation may be adopted by the Board of Directors.
