3,748 Books Are Circulated, Ewing Readership Upped, Librarian Says

EWING — Exactly 3,748 books were checked out to readers at the public library during the year of 1958. Over two thousand of this number were to juvenile readers of the community. Rural teachers checked out approximately 250 books to be used as supplementary reading in their schools.

Mrs. E. R. Harris, librarian, also reports an increase of readers from the grades of the Ewing public school.

Seventy-five new books were purchased for the library the past year. The newest books, plus an additional vacation loan of 75 books, were available to this community through the Nebraska Public Library Commission. Other books requested by readers were also secured from the commission.

The Ewing News and Clearwater Record, a gift to the library by the publishers, and magazines donated to the library, have provided other reading material.
