Here's Time-Saver for Homemakers

A cooky recipe that can be mixed and stored in the refrigerator to bake fresh every few days is a wonderful time-saver for homemakers who have several cooky lovers in the house.

Here's a suitable one for crisp, buttery Pecan Refrigerator Cookies offered to us by Owen Parkinson, salesman of the local Meadow Gold Dairy, who confides that it is one of his favorites for evening snacks with milk.

The recipe makes a big batch. But according to Beatrice Cooke, director of the test kitchens in Chicago, who developed it, you can bake small portions of the dough at a time.

Pecan Refrigerator Cookies (Makes 14 dozen)

1 pound butter
1 pound light brown sugar
2 eggs
2 teaspoons vanilla
4 cups sifted all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon salt
1 pound chopped pecans

Cream butter and sugar together until light and fluffy. Beat in eggs, one at a time. Add vanilla. Add sifted dry ingredients; mix thoroughly. Stir in pecans. Divide into 6 portions; shape into rolls about 1 3/4 inches in diameter. Wrap in waxed paper and chill overnight or longer. Slice about 1/4 inch thick. Bake on greased cooky sheet at 375 degrees for 10 minutes or until delicately browned.
