Mid-morning brunch following the Easter parade might well feature these Oriental Baked Eggs, says Owen Parkinson, salesman of the local Meadow Gold Dairy. The recipe is timely for this season when eggs are most plentiful and popular.

Created by Beatrice Cooke, director of the dairy company's test kitchens in Chicago, the breakfast dish is simple to prepare, for the eggs are simply baked in a seasoned cream and served atop toasted English muffins or toast.

Oriental Baked Eggs

(Six servings)
 6 English muffins or toast slices
 1/4 cup butter, softened
 3/4 cup grated natural cheddar cheese
 1 dozen eggs
 2/3 cup cream
 1 1/2 tablespoons soy sauce
 1 teaspoon salt
 1 teaspoon seasoning salt
 1/4 teaspoon white pepper
 1/4 cup butter
 1 4-ounce can mushrooms, finely chopped
 1 5-ounce can water chestnuts, finely chopped
 1/4 cup minced parsley
 Split English muffins, toast under broiler until golden brown. Spread with butter while hot. Butter baking cups. Sprinkle a tablespoon grated cheese in bottom of each cup, reserving the rest to sprinkle on top. Break an egg into each cup. Combine cream and seasonings; mix well. Pour a tablespoon cream mixture over each egg. Sprinkle cheese over each. Bake at 325 degrees for 12-15 minutes or until desired doneness. Cook mushrooms and water chestnuts in butter until lightly browned. Stir in parsley and cook 1 minute. Spoon mixture on muffins. Carefully slip eggs onto muffins. Serve immediately.
