India has been divided into two separate areas. Each having a government of its own. Miss MacLachlan's work has been in the same area but under the name of West Pakistan.

Miss MacLachlan's work is that of a teacher. She instructs others in educating the illiterate adult's to read.

About 90 percent of the population are completely illiterate, she said.

The teacher's duties are to help christians and non-christians how to read the Bible. An average adult can learn to read parts of it in about three months averaging two hours study daily.

Miss MacLachlan has been spending the past 18 months with her mother in Atkinson. She was called home because of the death of her father, Mr. Robert MacLachlan.
