Aspiring writers from the midwest will meet May 22, 23 and 24 for the fourteenth annual Writers Conference at the Hotel Paxton in Omaha. This event is sponsored by the Omaha Writers Club.

A special feature of this conference will be a lecture delivered by Joseph E. Thornton, special agent in charge of the Omaha office of the FBI. Thornton will detail work by the Federal Bureau of Investigation to assist prospective authors of mystery and detective fiction.

The conference will be under the direction of Dr. Leo V. Jacks, president of the Omaha Writers Club and Creighton University faculty member. In addition to his duties as Director of the Department of Classical Languages at Creighton, Dr. Jacks is a successful free-lance writer. He is the author of numerous articles as well as popular fiction. His writing has ranged from short

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Stories to complete novels and biographies.

Other staff members for the conference will be Mrs. Norma R. Youngberg, instructor in creative writing at San Jose State College, San Jose, Cal., Prof. Ralph M. Wardle of the University of Omaha staff, and Austin Phelps, editor of publications for the Omaha Corps of Engineers.

Each of these three staff members are successful writers as an avocation. Among the books written by Mrs. Youngberg are "Queen's Gold," "The Miracle of the Song" and "The Tiger of Bitter Valley." In addition to many articles, Professor Wardle has written "Oliver Goldsmith, a Biography." Mr. Phelps serves as consultant for such magazines as Popular Mechanics, Popular Science, Science and Mechanics and Home Mechanics. His articles have appeared in several magazines.
