

# Academy Breaks Three Sand Hill Records Place First in a Field of 17 State Teams

Three records fell at the Sand Hill Relays in Bassett this week-end at the hands of the St. Mary's track squad.

The Academy won first place in over-all competition in a field of 17 teams from north-central Nebraska.

A total of 67 points were compiled by the Cardinals as well as several first places.

Valentine, with 50 points, was second; Mullen with 41 third; Bassett with 32 fourth and O'Neill High 24 points for fifth place.

St. Mary's broke records in the 440 and 880 yard relays as well as the shot-put by Larry Tomlinson.

Lambert Belina, Gene Schneider, Larry Donohoe and Larry Tomlinson teamed-up on the 440 yard relay with a time of 45 and 4/10th seconds.

Jim Shoemaker, Lambert Belina, Larry Donohoe and Larry Tomlinson teamed to break the 880 yard relay record with a time of one minute, 36 and 4/10th seconds. The previous record held by Ainsworth was one minute, 36 and 9/10th seconds.

Tomlinson was also awarded the Rock County Leader trophy for the "most outstanding athletic performance of the year."

The teacher, Mrs. Sarah Allyn, announced that we would have a birthday party for Earla and Dorothy Newman's on April 3.



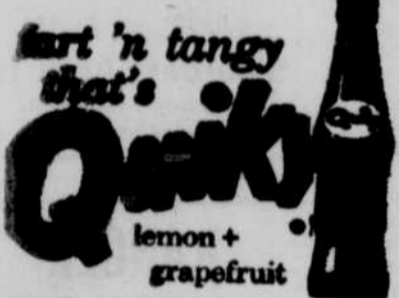

Atkinson, Tuesday, April 14th  
Auction: Cattle and hog receipts installed 442 head. The run included quite a number of registered Bulls which sold from \$250.00 to \$570.00 per head. Light weight replacement cattle sold steady—no choice kinds to test the top of the market. 350 to 450 lb. steers \$35.00 to \$38.50 others eligible to \$49.00 cwt. Quite a few heifers offered selling largely \$30.00 to \$33.25 cwt. Yearling kinds scarce. Steers \$26.00 to \$29.50 sold light yearlings to \$28.00 cwt., heifers \$25.00 to \$27.00 a few to \$28.50 others on the early order down to \$23.00 cwt. No stock cows offered except a few with calves at side. These went from \$200.00 to \$250.00 per pair and the cows were as the canner order. Butcher cattle sold on a very active market, canner and low cutters the slowest, mostly \$15.00 to \$18.25 some to \$16.75. Beef cows \$17.00 to \$18.25. Bulls sold 50 cwt lower \$19.00 to \$21.50 cwt. Butcher hogs 190 to 240 lb. at \$25.50 to \$45.50 cwt.
