CHARLES SPANN

Funeral services for Charles Spann were held Friday at 1:30 p.m. at the Methodist church in Chambers with the pastor, Rev. Charles Cox officiating. Burial was at Bassett.

Charles Frederick Spann was born at Centerville near Lincoln May 1, 1879, to Frederick and Augusta Spann and departed this life May 5, 1939, at the age of 80 years and 4 days.

At the age of 13 he moved with his parents in a caravan of eight covered wagons to Rock county.

He later went to Council Bluffs where he was married to Bernice Spann. To this union was born one son, Virgil, who survives. He made his home in Atkinson for many years.

On June 17, 1945, he was married to Jane Robertson and for the last fourteen years has resided in Chambers.

He pursued the carpenter trade all his life.

Survivors are his wife, Jane; two brothers, Martin and Henry, both of Bassett; two step children—Van Robertson of Chambers and May De Kay of Lafayette, Ind.

Those preceding him in death were two brothers, August and William, and two sisters, Maggie Strelow and Sarah Brown.
