Increased Operation Costs Prompts Request for Increase In Telephone Rates

The Public Telephone Company announces its intention to file an Application with the Nebraska State Railway Commission for authority to increase telephone rates for local service at its Arnold, Callaway, Oconto, Stapleton, Ewing and Page exchanges. The proposed monthly increases range from 25c to \$1.25 depending upon the class of service furnished.

Maintenance material costs and taxes have increased substantially since the last general rate adjustment in April of 1952. Company management has found it necessary to make certain wage adjustments to certain of its employees from time to time since the year 1952. Other employees have not received any wage increases since the last rate adjustment. Several of our local employees are requesting an upward wage adjustment at this time and it will be necessary for the Company to obtain rate relief in order to grant the needed wage increases.

Approximately 56% of the additional revenue that would be derived from the proposed rate increase would be used for local employee wage adjustments. Various forms of operating taxes would take 21% of the added revenue. The remaining 23% would be available for debt service and the purchase of new plant ma-
