

# Mother and Son **Bound Over to** District Court

BUTTE—Mrs. Sadie Dickerson, 59, denied "augering" a brace and bit into her son's head at the preliminary hearing held for her and her other son, Nyal Franch, 17, before County Judge J. P. Clas-

The Boyd county courtroom was filled to capacity as Judge Classon bound the pair, charged with first degree murder, over to appear before a district court judge in September.

As a result of "sufficiently conflicting testimony" in the hearing of Mrs. Dickerson, and because similar testimony "would be given for and against either party," according to Judge Classon, the preliminary hearing of Franch was waived.

Dr. Robert Waters, an O'Neill physician who examined the body of Vanderlinde, told the court he believed that the young man died as a result of "the interruption of vital brain func-

Authorities contend that Vanderinde died as a result of a brace and bit wound in the head.

The physician said the wound in Vanderlinde's head was from 'four to four and one half inches

Mrs. Dickerson, when called to the stand denied admitting the murder of her son. Earlier, Boyd County Sheriff Claude Co Gerald Tesch, investigator for the State Patrol, said Mrs. Dickerson, when being questioned in custody,

told them "yes, I did it." Nyal Franch, also called to the stand told the court under examination that he and Vanderlinde had arguments in the past and that the day Vanderlinde died, they had argued about who was to do some welding on the farm nine miles northwest of

Franch told the court that Van-delinde struck his thumb with a welding rod and it was after this that he had thrown the brace and

He was then asked by the atorney to show the injury to the

judge which he did.

In earlier testimony, when Dr. Waters was being question-ed, Cronin asked Dr. Waters if his investigation revealed bone splinters on the inside of the skull "similar to that you would fnd on the inside of a board being bored." The physician said

Mrs. Dickerson testified that she and Franch had discussed Vanderbeen arrested and that she suggested "telling people" that the death was an accident.

Mrs. Dickerson said she thought then of "saving Nyal." The 58-year old mother of the two boys appeared very nervous and cried at times through the hearing. Her son, Nyal Franch, managed only one faint smile during the two-hour, preliminary hearing of his mother.
