O'Neill's eight returning lettermen showed plenty of football savvy as they turned the disadvantage of fewer first downs into winning drives. Plainview received 26 to

O'Neill fans are pleased with Jake Hawley, the high school's new football coach. He led his boys exceptionally well against an overwhelmingly larger Plainview team The Eagles were outweighed on the average, per man, by 16 pounds. Here is a rundown of the key plays by halves:

First Half

In the first quarter O'Neill drove down to Plainview's 4 but failed to score when they lost the ball on downs. This was to be an indication of much of the grinding football that followed. Often, both Plainview and O'Neill would drive deep into enemy territory only to be held back by solid defensive

In the second quarter Dennis Tomlinson, Eagle guard (see feature picture on this page) recovered a fumble on his own 40 and then hiked to the 8 where he was tripped up by Plainview secondary.
