Mr. and Mrs. Dean Brockmeyer and family went to Stuart on Sunday and were dinner guests of Mr. and Mrs. Bud McClurg.

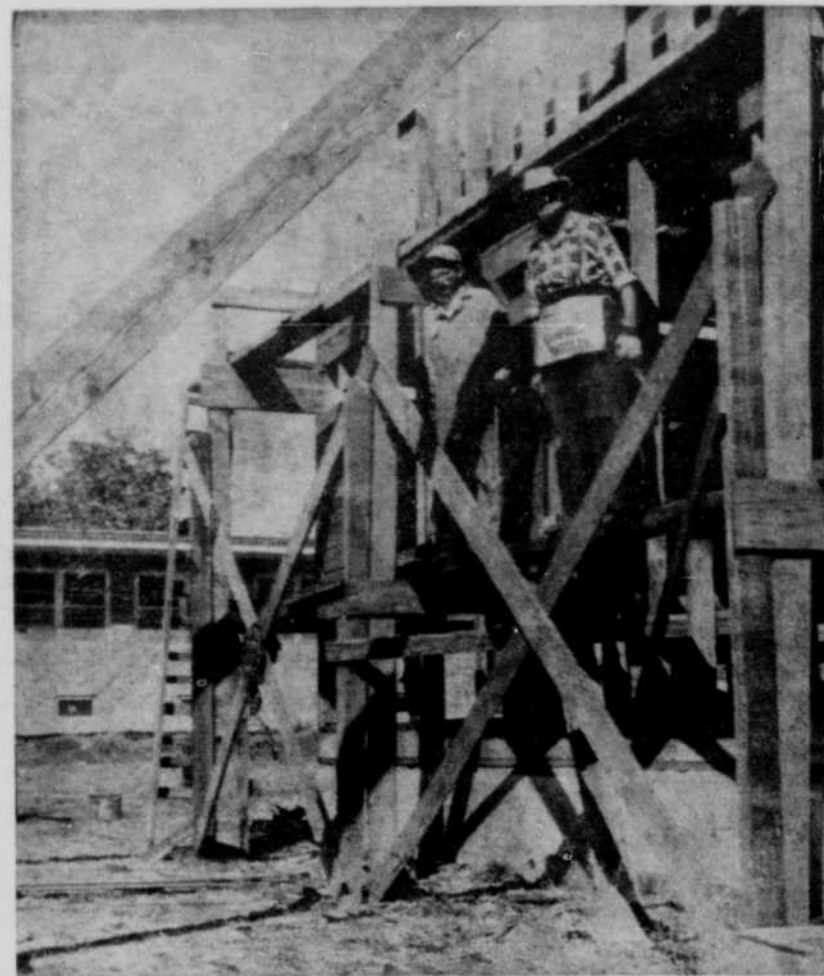

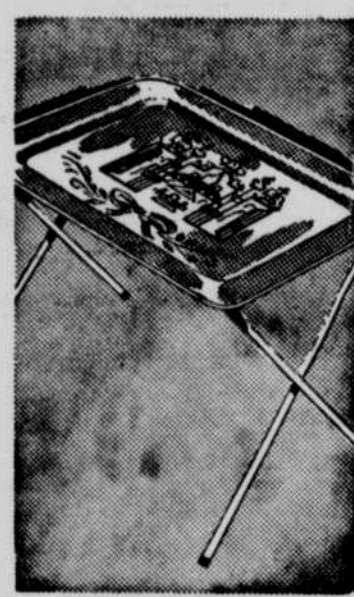

Waffles with Sausage Good Sunday Breakfast

Waffles with sausages for a leisurely Sunday breakfast never lose their appeal, especially when the waffle recipe is varied occasionally. Favored by Joe Sivesind of the Meadow Food Dairy are these buttermilk cornmeal waffles. They're particularly timely now, for both butter and buttermilk are plentiful.

The recipe was developed by Beatrice Cooke, director of the company's Chicago test kitchens.

Buttermilk Cornmeal Waffles (Six Waffles)
 1 cup sifted flour
 3/4 cup yellow cornmeal
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 2 teaspoons baking powder
 1/2 teaspoon soda
 2 egg yolks, beaten
 1 1/4 cups buttermilk
 1/2 cup melted butter
 2 egg whites, beaten stiff
 Sift together dry ingredients. Combine egg yolks, buttermilk and butter. Stir into dry ingredients. Fold in egg whites. Bake in hot waffle baker until brown and crisp, about 5 minutes. Serve with butter and hot waffle syrup.

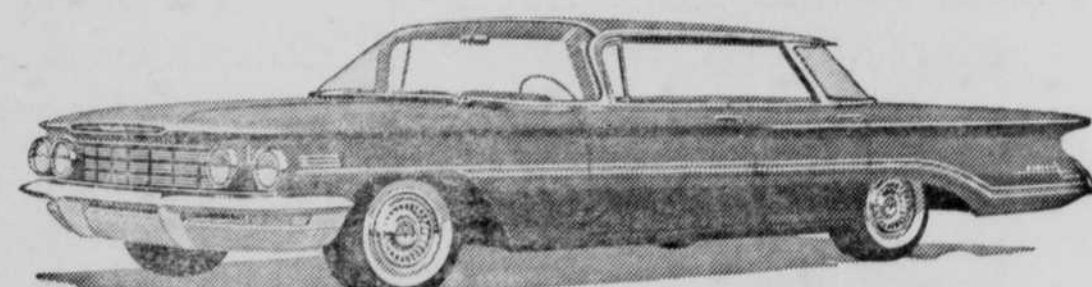
