1 1/2-ounce can water chestnuts, drained and sliced

Melt butter in sauce pan. Stir in flour and seasonings. Gradually add milk and lemon juice. Cook over low heat until slightly thickened. Stir in blue cheese and water chestnuts. Serve hot over green vegetables.
