

Marcellus actually has his choice of prizes between the \$20,000 check or a thoroughbred race horse already trained and entered in the Kentucky Derby. If he were to accept the race horse and the horse should win, Marcellus could win at least

In 1958 the winner of the race, Tim Tam, won \$116,400, 1957's winner, Iron Liege, won \$107,950 and the 1956 winner, Needles, won

To enter the contest Marcellus had to sell a certain number of Ford tractors. Then, for every tractor sold over this number, he

received another entry blank. During this sales contest, the Ford company also held a nationwide confest among farmers to determine the most important feature of their new Selecto-Matic tractor attachment. According to the company, there are 12 important features to the attachment and farmers were asked to rank them in order of their importance.

Then all of the Ford tractor dealers in America, some 2.600 of them, were asked to estimate the order of importance of the 12 Selecto-Matic features.


