With the feel of spring in the air one has the urge to take a look at the trees and plants to see how they stood the winter. I have heard some remark that tulips were show-ing when there was still plenty

The best time to prune fruit trees is late March and early Ap-ril. For young trees it is best to use hard shears or a sharp knife. If your fruit trees are older or larger it is best to use a hand pruning saw or lopping shears. After planting fruit trees careful pruning will aid toward the young trees shaping properly and also give them balance and strong, well distributed branches.

Here are a few ideas which may help to spark up those foods which one gets tired of fixing the same way all the time.

Three ways to fix mashed po-Put your leftover mashed pota toes, which you have seasoned with onion, parsley or pimiento between two slices of luncheon meat, mak-ing a sandwich. Bake 15 minutes at 325 degrees on a baking sheet. Another way is to nest eggs in a bed of hot, mashed potatoes, mixed with bacon and onion. Place


