Strawberry Dessert For Sallies on Diet Says Supervisor B. Perry

Sallies on slimming diets should devour this molded strawberry orange dessert, says Bill Perry, local supervisor of the Meadow Gold Dairy plant. It is a three-layer fruit and custard combination in which low calorie skim milk is used to prepare the creamy custard mixture.

The trick is getting the three gelatin layers to adhere nicely yet not run together, points out Beatrice Cooke, test kitchen director for the dairy, is to let each gelatin layer thicken slightly before spooning it over the next layer.

Strawberry Orange Dessert
(Six servings)

1 package strawberry flavored gelatin
1 1/2 cups hot pineapple juice
1/2 cup mandarin orange syrup
2 egg yolks
1/3 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 cups skim milk
1 envelope (1 tablespoon) unflavored gelatin
2 egg whites, beaten stiff
2 tablespoons sugar

Dissolve strawberry flavored gelatin in hot pineapple juice. Add orange syrup. Pour 1 cup gelatin into a 1 quart mold. Chill until slightly thickened. Chill remaining gelatin until slightly thickened. Beat egg yolks until thick and lemon colored. Beat in sugar and salt. Stir in 1 1/2 cups skim milk. Cook over boiling water until mixture coats a spoon. Soften unflavored gelatin in remaining 1/2 cup skim milk for 5 minutes. Dissolve in hot custard mixture. Chill until slightly thickened. Then beat until frothy and stir in mandarin oranges. Add fruit flavored gelatin in mold. Chill slightly. Last, spoon remaining 1/2 cup gelatin over top. Chill until firm.
