# **To Blue Grass Seed Producers**

Your Blue Grass is almost ready to harvest, and I would like to pass along to you some information which could be of considerable value to you.

Those of you who have Blue Grass on higher ground can very successfully windrow, and combine it out of the windrow the same as small grain, with good results. I would appreciate it if those of you who have windrowers and combines, and would be interested in doing some of this work, get in touch with me, as I will probably be asked where such equipment can be hired ,or perhaps the work done on a share deal.

Also, having the field of Blue Grass and threshing the stacks in the fall has proved very successful for a number of farmers and ranchers. And to those of you who will strip and cure your Blue Grass, don't leave the green seed in the sacks or truck more than a half day, as the heating will hurt the germination of the seed. Be careful with those side delivery rakes and power brooms, as you can quickly make a mess of your stripping with sand and dirt.
