Typewriter Aids Letter Writing For Mrs. Borg

In this modern day and age in which we are living, we find new modern appliances wending their way into every home. Every young mother, grandmother and great-grandmother is concerned about time saving methods in saving work in their everyday tasks.

The women in the Meek community are no exception. They have

problems to solve along these lines as well as their city cousins.

Mrs. Axel Borg's family of six children have all taken on the responsibility of home life and raising a family of their own. Five of the children have settled far from home, two daughters and a son have chosen California for their home. One son is living in Seattle, Wash., and one son is still in the Air Force at Orlando, Fla. One son still lives in Holt County.

However the family still maintains a regular letter writing schedule and this means that Mrs. Borg must write to each of the families

The older daughter, LaVern Kirwan, visited her folks the winter of 1958, heard her mother remark that she wished she knew how to type and noting how many hours she spent in writing each of the children every week, she not only suggested but insisted her mother take the twelve week course being offered by Esther Kinmer, the commercial teacher from O'Neill high school.

Mrs. Borg, a grandmother with 13 grandchildren, was a little skeptical at attempting the new venture, but after much urging, she finally consented to take the course.

Unfortunately, after taking only three lessons, Mrs. Borg had to enter the hospital for surgery and was unable to complete the course. Disappointed but undaunted, she was determined to continue typing with the knowledge she had already obtained.

Mrs. Borg says, though she is far from being an expert at typing, she finds it to be one of her greatest time saving devices. By the use of carbon paper the five weekly general news letters are written at one time and the answers to the personal letters are added to each.

However, there is also another way to keep contact with your family that is away from home. A subscription to the Frontier will bring this weekly messenger, carrying all the news, into the homes of your loved ones.
