The Sign Says . . .

No. 11 Pony Farm, The Barnes Kids

Two miles south of Atkinson on highway 11 the passerby is greeted by this eye catching sign. No. 11 PONY FARM BARNES KIDS. To adults it brings a wish they could revert to the jeans and pony tail age. To young would-be cowboys it is Cloud nine.

Ponies are everywhere. Spotted, sorrel, cream, dappled. Some the blocky sturdy type so long associated with the term Shetland. Others have a smooth slim conformation that a few years ago was unheard of in ponies of this kind. Fuzzy fairy like colts bounce along behind their miniature mo-

The farm is a recent ven-ture begun a little over two years ago. The KIDS of the sign years ago. The KIDS of the sign are the children of Mr. and Mrs. Dale Barnes of Atkinson Ronnie who is 13, Barbara 12, Jerry 11, Beverly 9, and Kenny (definitely the junior member) who is half past 2. The sponsor and adviser of the project is their interested grandfather, Irven Parsons a retired rancher ven Parsons, a retired rancher who lives next door to the cor-

poration. The venture was triggered a couple of years back when a new type of motor car was being promoted by giving away a pony to the child who submitted the best name. Jerry Barnes was lucky. Skeeter became a new member of an admiring family.

"The kids were so interested," Mr. Parsons said. "That it seemed like a good idea to start them in business for themselves." The kids enthusiastically agreed. A suitable place was obtained, ten shetlands purchased, and they

were in business. The thing mushroomed. New ponies were added. Colts made their appearance. A beautiful sorrel stud bearing the impressive name Maple City's Golden Sunlight was added to the menage to the tune of \$500 cash on the barrel head. The kids were catching on fast. They learned the selling as well as the buying end of the operation.

"We break and train the ponies after they are a year old," says eleven year old Jerry. He can quote you pedigrees, names, prices and give you a rundown of the success of the operation in nothing flat. About 25 head have been sold to date, the horses bringing from \$60 to \$135. The mares \$230 to \$700.

It is hard to say who has ben-efitted most from the experiment, the kids, who are learning in-valuable lessons to be used in the future or a benevolent grand-father who is getting his kicks out of the present.
