

Capitol News - Nebraskans Need Protection From Groups Selling Promotional Land

LINCOLN—Acting State Engineer John Hossack has reported Nebraska has taken the right course in building the Interstate highway.

But, said the acting engineer "we would have turned our backs on the critical highway needs." By coming from western Nebraska with the four-lane road, Hossack said, the state could have had 150 miles of the interstate built if construction had been concentrated between North Platte and the Wyoming border.

Regarding gravel roads in Nebraska, Hossack said they can all be converted to dustless surfaces during the next six years if there is no change in allocation of federal money. He also suggested that the next Legislature establish some kind of a revolving fund to permit the advance purchasing of highway right-of-way in cases where a delay would make the property more costly.

LEGAL NOTICE OF A MEASURE TO BE VOTED UPON NOVEMBER 8, 1960. BALLOT TITLE AND TEXT OF CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT PROPOSED BY THE 1960 LEGISLATURE (EXTRAORDINARY SESSION)

Proposed Amendment No. 1. Constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to permit counties, cities and villages to acquire, develop and own real and personal property to be leased to private enterprises for manufacturing and industrial use, and to issue revenue bonds to defray the cost thereof.

TEXT OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT. Be it enacted by the people of the State of Nebraska, Section 1. That at the general election in November, 1960, there shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska for approval the following amendment to Article XV of the Constitution of Nebraska, which is hereby proposed by the Legislature:

LEGAL NOTICE OF A MEASURE TO BE VOTED UPON NOVEMBER 8, 1960. BALLOT TITLES AND TEXTS OF CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS PROPOSED BY THE 1959 LEGISLATURE. Proposed Amendment No. 1. Constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide by law such measures and procedures as may be necessary to insure continuity of governmental operations in emergencies resulting from enemy attack or imminent threat thereof.

TEXT OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT. Be it enacted by the people of the State of Nebraska, Section 1. That at the general election in November, 1960, there shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska for approval the following amendment to Article III of the Constitution of Nebraska, which shall be a new section to be known as section 29, and which is hereby proposed by the Legislature:

Proposed Amendment No. 2. Constitutional amendment to provide that preferred stockholders may or may not have a vote and that preferred stock may or may not be of equal par value of all stock of the corporation.

TEXT OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT. Be it enacted by the people of the State of Nebraska, Section 1. That at the general election in November, 1960, there shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska for approval the following amendment to Article VIII, section 1, of the Constitution of Nebraska, which is hereby proposed by the Legislature:

Proposed Amendment No. 3. Constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide a different method of taxing livestock and to provide for reciprocal and proportionate taxation of livestock located in this state for only part of a year.

Proposed Amendment No. 4. Constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to provide a different method of taxing livestock and to provide for reciprocal and proportionate taxation of livestock located in this state for only part of a year.

Proposed Amendment No. 5. Constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to establish bonded and licensed warehouses or storage areas for goods, wares, and merchandise in transit in the state which are intended for and which are shipped to final destinations outside this state, and to exempt such goods, wares, and merchandise from ad valorem taxation while in such warehouses or storage areas.

Proposed Amendment No. 6. Constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to provide a different method of taxing motor vehicles and to provide for reciprocal and proportionate taxation of motor vehicles located in this state for only part of a year.

Proposed Amendment No. 7. Constitutional amendment to provide that each member of the Legislature shall receive a salary of not to exceed two hundred dollars per month.

Proposed Amendment No. 8. Constitutional amendment to provide for election of more than one county judge for each county and for forming county judge judicial districts.

Proposed Amendment No. 9. Constitutional amendment to provide for election of more than one county judge for each county and for forming county judge judicial districts.
