ROYAL—With the acquisition of a span of hethland miles hitched to a fancy decorated circus wagon, Bobbie Johnson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Everett Johnson, has elevated himself to a spot in the limelight equal to Roy Rogers and the rest of the famous folk who enter to the interest of the small fry.

The mules, now retired from active duty have been stars in a circus ring, have traveled abroad and marched in the Rose Bowl parade and other like prominent show places.

From the amount of interest shown and the number of visitors at the Johnson farm there is a possibility that the circus wagon will also have to be retired and forced back into active service, along with the dwarf mules.
