Attracted by the united effort of the entire community. the Lichter Duo-Rest Company three years ago located a small plant in Scottsbluff for the manufacture of furnishings for mobile homes.

Last summer, the company moved into a new 100x300 foot building and expanded its operations to also include the manufacture of conventional home furnishings, and furnishings for steamship lines and privately owned boats. The payroll now includes more than 40 employees.

To serve the new factory, Consumers Public Power District built a new 3-phase, 7200-volt line.
