VOTE FOR THE SCHOOL BOND ISSUE For A New O'Neill Senior High School NOV. 8 WHY WE NEED A NEW HIGH SCHOOL TO SATISFY NEEDS OF THE DISTRICT Our school district will have 194 high school students in 1964, just counting present grade school enrollment. High school tuition students would have to be dropped by 1964--this will result in a \$34,000 loss of revenue. This \$34,000 loss require a 7/4-mill levy raise, or the same as the proposed new school. The auditorium will serve as a ssembly room and will house shops, heating plant, rest rooms (school and public), storage rooms and locker rooms. If these are built instead of a gym, a saving of from \$20,000 to \$30,000 would result. To build a gym at a later date would cost \$150,000, so the new gym would actually cost \$20,000 to build at the present time and save \$130,000 at a later date or more as costs of building raise.
