


PROPOSED BY THE 1959 LEGISLATURE

Proposed Amendment No. 1

Constitutional a m e n dment authorizing the Leg-islature to provide by law such measures and procedures as may be necessary to insure continuity of gov-ernmental operations in emergencies resulting from

enemy attack or imminent

threat thereof.
