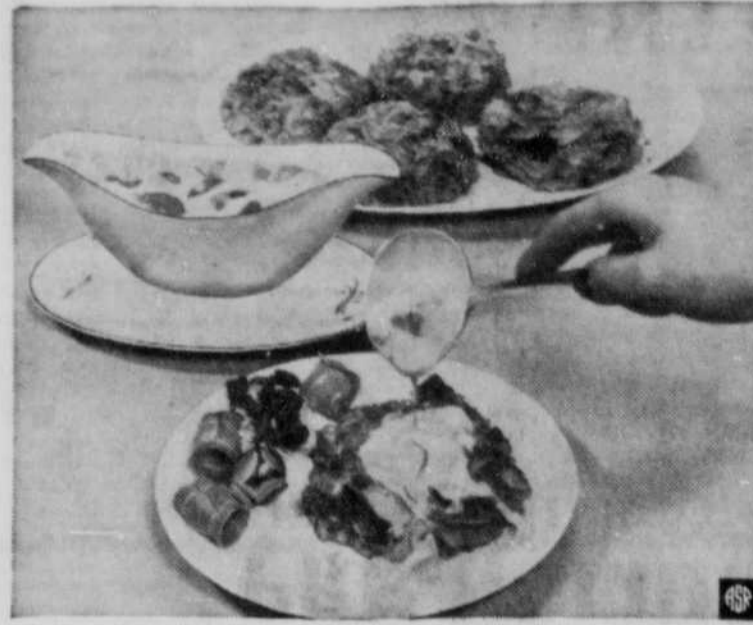

For United States Senator, Curtis 194 — Conrad 77; Governor, Cooper 144 — Morrison 51; Lt. Governor, Burney 186 — Otto 78; Public Accountant, Johnson 179 — Broderick 70; State Treasurer, Swanson 154 — Larsen 96; Attorney General, Meyer 167 — Baldwin 70; Railway Commissioner, Larson 157 — Sorenson 79.

On the Congressional ticket it was Beermann 151 — Brook 119. In the local precinct: for justice of the Peace, Emil Ahlers led Clarence Michael by two votes, 137 to 135. With only a four vote difference, Lloyd with 137 was named Township clerk over Claude Schrage with 133. For Township Treasurer it was Darrel Peters 153 and Andrew Thiele, 121.
