LINCOLN - Nebraska's new governor, Democrat Frank Morrison of Lincoln, hit the charmed circle after 20 years in politics. Morrison, 55-year-old attorney, the state's 31st chief executive and the Eth Democrat, takes office in January. Until then, he says, he doesn't plan to make any major appointments.

Morrison worked in the Young Democratic organization 20 years ago, and first ran for a major office in 1948, seeking a Congressional seat. The next election he tried for governor but lost in the primary. In 1954 the attorney tried again for Congress, lieutenant governor in 1956 and in 1958 lost a whirl at the U.S. Senate post now held by Republican Roman Hruska.
