Social Security Change To Cover More Persons

People working for their children may be covered by social security after this year according to Clifford Kittelson, manager of the Norfolk social security office. The 1960 amendments to the

social security law change this beginning next year. In the future, people who work for their children in their children's business will be covered by social security. The work must be in connection with the operation of the business. This Includes work on farms if the worker's child operates the farm.

Work in and around the home of children is still not covered. That is, a person who is hired by his children to baby sit, keep house, do yard work, or other household work will still not be able to earn credit for social security payments. This is so even if the child happens to also operate a business or a farm.
