ternoon memorial dedication. The events leading up to the final dedication service Sunday reads like a fairy tale. News of an anonymous donation of \$5,000 to the Page church providing it was matched, set the Page community to work making arrangements to meet the condition imposed and ground was broken July 5, 1956 for the 24 by 50 addition on the north side of the church, enlarging the basement by those dimensions to accommodate a kitchen and work center (The Wesleyan Room).

Later as the new building took shape another \$5,000 request was made with the stipulation that the main part of the church be remodeled and renovated to match the new structure. A memorial gift from the children of the late Dr. E. J. Bild was used for the mother's room. A center entrance replaced the corner entrance and space to the left became a part of the sanctuary and also used for a class room. The added space provides a chapel, chancel and classroom. The old heating unit was removed and a pastor's study and two new rest rooms replace the space that formerly housed the staircase, kitchen and ladies' rest room.

The stained glass windows were retained, repaired, and re-leaded. All parts of the church have been renovated and refinished to match that of the new structure with new lighting fixtures replacing the old. A third bequest of \$5,000 allowed completion of the brick refacing and painting the trim. The 1961 dedication was made fifty years after the 1911 dedication when the main part of the church was dedicated.

Joseph Carlson of Laurel was the architect for the new addition and supervised the building with Merwyn French sr., responsible for local workmen. Many man hours of local people, both men and women cut the final cost appreciably. The first Methodist services were held by Rev. Bartley Blain in the George Jones soddy located one half mile south of the present site of Page in 1880. The Maxfield church was built on the northeast corner of the Jim Patterson farm in 1885 and

was dedicated November 15, Rev. J. R. Gortner was the minister. During the ministry of G. P. Bennett services were held in the old mill. The first Methodist church in Page was built during the pastorate of Rev. H. A. Chappell and dedicated June 26, 1898 with three hundred and fifty guests in attendance. The old Maxfield church was sold to John Kennedy who used the lumber for a barn. The little white frame church was replaced and dedicated in 1911 while Rev. Joseph Stoford was pastor. Mr. Shanner bought the old church building and moved it to the north side of the block where it served several uses before it was moved to the Shanner farm and converted into a barn. A new parsonage replaced the old one north of the church and was built a block north of the church on the east side of the street. The project was begun during the pastorate of Rev. McGaughey and completed while Rev. Todd was pastor. John Kennedy purchased the old parsonage and moved it to his farm where it became a home for his son and family.

Two Choice Face Wheat Growers in Today's Election

Wheat producers who vote in the August 24 wheat marketing quota referendum must decide between (1) marketing quotas with penalties on wheat produced in excess of 10 per cent lower 1962 allotments, a minimum national average support price of \$2.00 per bushel in 1962, and wheat stabilization payments for diverting the 10 per cent wheat acreage from production to conservation; or (2) no wheat marketing restrictions in 1962, no wheat stabilization payments, and parity support at 50 per cent of parity to those farmers who comply with their 10 per cent lower 1962 allotments. The current parity price for wheat is \$2.37 per bushel. These are the two basic choices facing wheat growers when they cast their ballots for the kind of wheat program that will be in effect for the 1962 crop. Roy Butterfield, Chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee, said today. He further stated that with a continued high level of supply and carryover in prospect, farmers will vote whether or not to accept wheat marketing quotas for the 1962 crop year. If wheat quotas are to become effective, they must be approved by at least two-thirds of the growers voting in the referendum. If quotas are not approved by wheat producers, those who choose to stay within their acreage allotments will be eligible for price support at 50 per cent of parity. However, in this case, there would be no penalties for excess production and no wheat stabilization payments for diverting the diverted acreage to conservation use.
