

Report from Washington

By Congressman Dave Martin Fourth District, Nebraska The proposed new farm program, as outlined by the Administration bill, H. R. 10010, calls for the strictest controls ever imposed on farmers - further acreage cuts in all feed grains and

wheat; stiffer penalties for noncompliance; and more power concentrated in the Secretary of Agriculture to lower the boom on prices to force compliance.

The basis of the feed grain program is as follows: 1. A yearly national quota for feed grains would be set which

would be converted into a national acreage allotment. The Secretary would distribute the

national allotment to States, counties and farms in the commercial feed grain area, using the years 1959-60 as a basis. The program would require mandatory

land retirement as determined by the Secretary, and support prices would be from 65 per cent to 90 per cent of parity. 2. The wheat program would be similar except for a two price system. Domestic wheat produc-

tion would probably be supported at around \$2.00, while the export wheat would be supported at around \$1.40. Further acreage cuts would be mandatory on the farmer. These controls and the details of the proposals should be looked over carefully.
