## Inman Student Vieing For Old Grouch Title



Twenty students at O'Neill public school plan to take the 1962 National Merit Scholarship Qualifying test, Vernon Carpenter, guidance director, announced today.

The test will be administered at the school at 9 a.m. March 6. All students who wish to be considered for merit scholarships to be awarded in 1963 must take the test at that time.

A qualifying test is composed of a three-hour examination of educational development. Scores of students who are examined in March will be reported to their schools by May 15. The scores are used by class advisors in many high schools to help students make decisions about college attendance and field of study
