Report from Washington

Applications from young men in the District who are interested in the service academies in 1963 are now being accepted in my office. Any young man who is interested in one of the academies is invited to write me for further information at: Room 140, House Office Building, Washington 25, D. C. Application forms and general information on the academy in which he is interested will be mailed immediately.

A candidate must be a legal resident of the District, between the ages of 17 and 22 by July 1, 1963, unmarried, and able to meet the physical and mental requirements of the academies. All District candidates are requested to take a preliminary Civil Service examination which will be held locally in Nebraska on July 9, 1962. Therefore, prospective candidates are urged to contact my office before June 1st, in order to compete in this examination.

After 14 years of socialized medicine in England, it is interesting to note that a shortage of British doctors is developing. Under socialized medicine, doctors are treated and paid as government clerks, rather than as professional men. A doctor is no longer his own master even in the practice of his skills. As a result, increasing numbers of British doctors are leaving England for Canada, Australia, America and other "backward" places where a doctor is not in

effect a government clerk. The training for medicine is one of the longest most arduous of any career. To go through it, a young man must be moved by many motives, including a desire to make a good living, to enter a profession where he would be his own master and not a hired employee, to have the satisfaction of being respected by his community, and to give the best care he can provide to the sick.

England's socialized medicine program has taken away these motives. There are those in this country who would like to delude our citizens with false promises and create the same problems here. I don't think that we are giving the medical profession enough credit for the outstanding job being done in this country. Our life span is the longest in history, and our national health the best of any country. This is due to the fine work of those in the field of medicine. We must ever be alert to be sure that these blessings are not taken from us.

Last week the Senate approved the purchase of \$100 million in UN bonds. This proposal will probably be taken up by the House in the near future. I wouldn't invest my own money in these bonds, and I don't think it wise to invest the taxpayers' money in them either. Consequently, I intend to vote in opposition to this proposal.

According to the House Leadership, we will have a few days recess from our legislative duties over Easter. Although the recess will be brief, I expect to return to the District for a few days and visit with as many people as I can during the period.
