England's socialized medicine

Report from Washington

Applications from young men in the District who are interested in the service academies in 1963 are now being accepted in my office. Any young man who is interested in one of the academies is invited to write me for further information at: Room 140, House Office Building, Washington 25, D. C. Application forms and general information on the academy in which he is interested will be mailed immediately.

A candidate must be a legal resident of the District, between the ages of 17 and 22 by July 1, 1963, unmarried, and able to meet the physical and mental requirements of the academies. All District candidates are requested to take a preliminary Civil Service examination which will be held locally in Nebraska on July 9, 1962. Therefore, prospective candidates are urged to contact my office before June 1st, in order to compete in this examina-
