O'Neill Junior Legion Takes First In Tourney

In the finals on Tuesday, Coach Joe Ollendick's crew staged an incredible comeback in the bottom of the seventh inning to take top trophy honors from Creighton.

Lyle Stewart started on the mound for O'Neill, scattering five hits through the first five frames while relying on strong infield support to pull him through any enemy scoring threats. Two unearned runs followed by two hits in the sixth brought on southpaw Keith Reynoldson with one down and runners on second and third. Considerable credit must be given to the little lefty who came in cold from the bench and retired the side on two pitches. The third Creighton run scored on an infield out and the next hitter lifted a high fly to left field on the first pitch to retire the side with three runs in.

With the comfort of a three-run lead, Creighton coasted upon Jerry Closter to close through the final two frames. But O'Neill, who remembered Closter's one-hitter of a year ago that cut short district tournament chances at the old Carney Park, was not about to go down without taking a full out.

The result was a three-run seventh inning that sent the game into an extra frame. Gary Brewster and Terry Kurtz walked and advanced to second and third to begin the surprising seventh. Then Rich Hill, no little fellow himself, tied into 6' 8" Closter's 3-2 pitch and sent a screaming single down the right-field line that scored Brewster and placed runners on first and third. Lyle Stewart came on with one down and went down swinging, but the ball popped from the catcher's glove and the throw brought in O'Neill's second run.

With two down now, Hill stole third and set the stage for Bob by Givens. Little Bobby (5' 8") cracked a grounder to the shortstop that was fielded, but the hurried throw to first sent Big Rich (6' 8") home with the tying run.

And then the spotlight was shifted once again to Reynoldson, who struck out the side in the top of the eighth after allowing a single to Closter, the only hit off him in his two and two-thirds inning relief stint.

But Reynoldson wasn't content with being a pitching hero. Leading off in the bottom of the eighth, he drew a walk, scurried to second on a beautiful sacrifice off the bat of Gary Brewster, and then ended the game and the tournament when he crossed the plate on an overthrow on an infield roller by Terry Kurtz.

First and second place trophies were presented after the game by Melvin Ruzicka of Simonson Post 93. Creighton Coach, Bob Larson received the second place award and Keith Reynoldson, representing the O'Neill team, received the first place trophy.

Highlights of the tourney were outstanding pitching performance, topped by Denny Wentz's no-hitter. Creighton's Jerry Closter and Don Bartholomew of Ainsworth both tossed one-hitters in
