## School Site Discussed By Board

Members of the O'Neill board of education Tuesday night met with Dr. F. J. Kubitschek to discuss the price of a tract of land suitable for a school site.

The board was following a recommendation of the Citizens committee to acquire more land for a school site and, specifically, the land owned by Dr. Kubitschek.

A portion of the approximately 20-acre tract had already been sold. Dr. Kubitschek said, but approximately 17 acres remain and the purchaser is willing to take an easternmost portion to permit the school to buy land adjacent to the athletic field.

Dr. Kubitschek said if the school would purchase the remainder of the tract — 17 acres — he would sell it for \$23,000, and pointed out that 16 lots per block at \$400 per lot brought the value of a block to \$6,400.

About three and one-half blocks make up the tract now. No action could be taken as the meeting was only to discuss with Dr. Kubitschek the possible sale of his land.

## Fire At Royal Takes Two Lives Early Tuesday

ROYAL — A 33 year old mother of nine and her five-year-old daughter died Tuesday morning in a fire which partially destroyed their two story frame house. The dead are Mrs. Louis Waterman and her daughter, Ellen.

Mrs. Waterman died of suffocation as she tried to rescue Ellen from an upstairs bedroom.

According to firemen the blaze apparently started in the electrical system near the fuse box where the lines enter the house. The flames burned several feet of cable, traveled up through the walls and into the attic.
