Things are made new, time makes them old and in many cases obsolete. Many years ago this northern Community of which this writer has been a time resident was served by a telephone line constructed and maintained by John A. Robertson, a name familiar to many of

our Holt county pioneers and also familiar to many yet living.

Mr. Robertson gave undivided attention and devotion to a switch at his home at Joy so that we in this rural area could have connection with the town of O'Neill and outside points. After the passing of Mr. Robertson, a new telephone company was organized known as the Leonie Telephone Co., and a new line, commencing at Senator Frank Nelson's ranch and running to O'Neill serving twenty patrons was constructed.

A little over a year ago the Bell Telephone company moved into the community and constructed a line which ultimately will be a dial system. Last week the Leonie Telephone Co. called out their members and the old line was removed, thus passing, because of the wheel of progress, a system of communication which served us all very well and which rather pulls at the heart strings of some of us who have lived through and enjoyed the old neighborly line so much.

Final dissolution of the company will be made at the Pad-dock township hall Monday night, October 1.

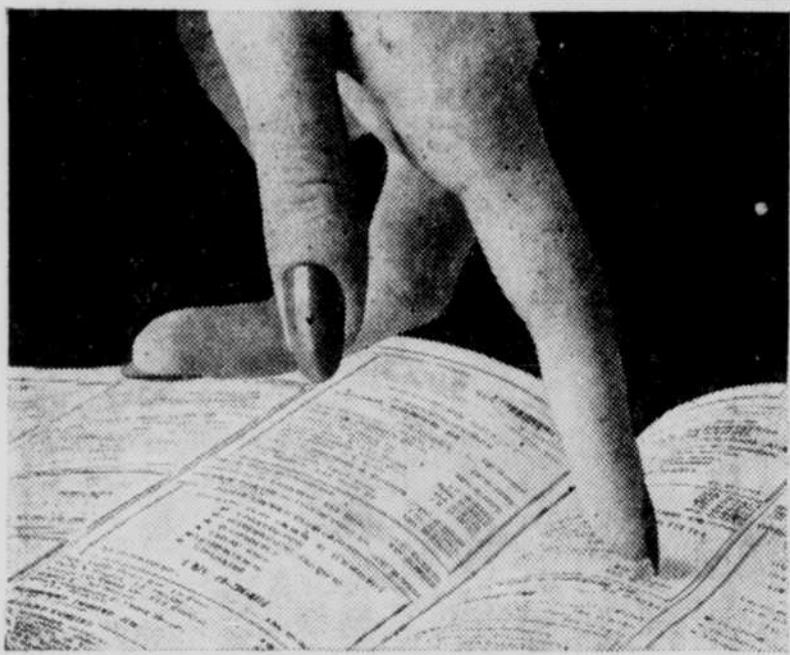

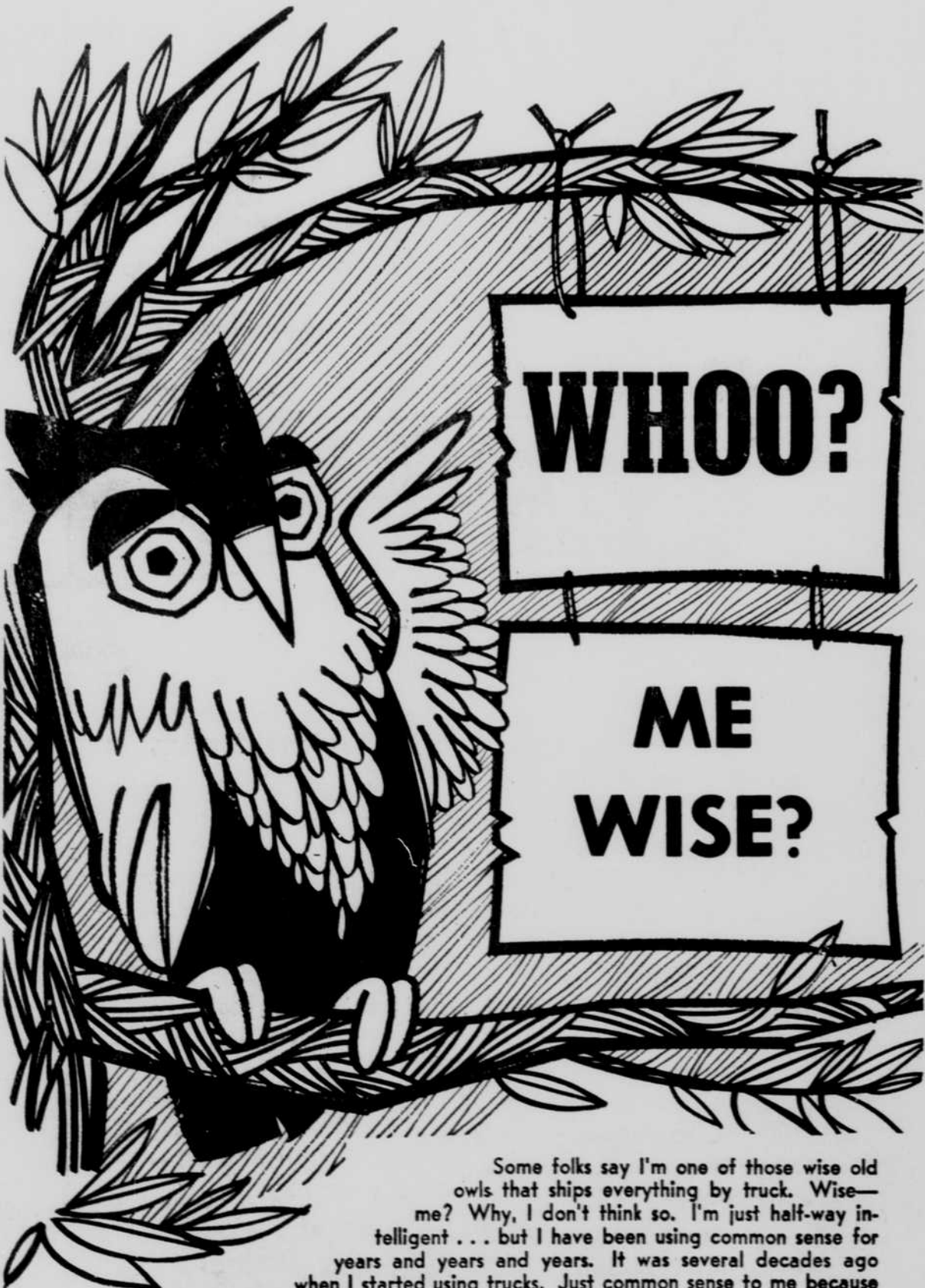

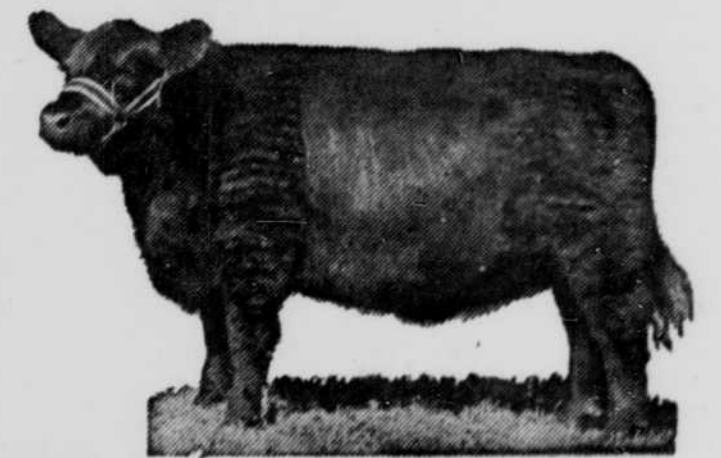
