A happy crew of O'Neill High Eagles battled Ainsworth last Friday evening and walked away with a hard-earned 20-6 victory, and their second straight Eastern Rangeland Conference championship. Senior fullback, Steve Peterson led the way for Coach Jim Taylor's eleven, averaging nearly eight yards per carry before being taken out of the closing minutes of the game because of an ailing leg.

The OHS team lost the toss, of course (they've yet to win the flip-of-the-coin bit in their first five contests), and the Eagles kicked off to the anxious Bulldogs to open action in the 4th annual Homecoming classic.

A tough defense forced the visitors to punt, and the Eagles' offense responded with a 62-yard sustained march that resulted in a quick 7-0 lead. The first quarter march was led by 'Power Pony' Peterson, who carried for gains of 13 and 28 yards. Enormous end Rich Hill grabbed a pass and raced the final ten yards to score. Terry Kurtz carried for the extra point, and the Eagles seemed well on their way.

After again forcing the opposition to punt, OHS began their second march toward paydirt only to have a pass interception halt their drive on the 18-yard line. A fumble and Ainsworth's second aerial theft put stoppers on the other Eagle drives in the first half. End Gary Plessell, 152 pound senior, thwarted all Bulldog attempts in the first two quarters, playing exceptionally tough in his final Homecoming contest. Twelve OHS seniors saw their finale in Homecoming activities in Friday night's battle.

After the intermission, the Eagles started off as though their minds were still on everything but football. Two fumbles and an unsuccessfull sweep attempt forced the Eagles to punt, and Ainsworth began their only scoring drive from 44 yards out. Senior halfback Royce Greder popped over from three to cap the march, but the try for the extra point was unsuccessful. Not unusual though, the Eagle defense has yet to allow an extra point

to be scored against them so far this season. Really fired up now, the 'Big Blue' bulled its way to the second tally of the battle, with fullback Ron Kallhoff thundering through from the 17-yard line. The extra point was unsucessful, and the home town boys led 1'-0.

The final scoring march came in the final stanza when senior quarterback Terry Kurtz floated a 31 yard TD toss to flanker Rich Frost. The flashy halfback made per carry. a dazzling reception and eluded his defender to complete an exceptionally well-executed play. Kurtz took advantage of fine faking and again carried across the point-after-touchdown, and the

score ended at 20-6. The O'Neill defense was again exceptional, with Plessell leading the way. Senior Homecoming attendent, Rick Devall also turned in a fine job at his defensive halfback position. Penalties, fumbles and pass interceptions kept the OHS eleven from really racking the Bulldogs, as their Homecoming efforts were

not to be denied. The real clincher of the evening came about 30 minutes after the final whistle ended the O'-Neill-Ainsworth game, when word reached town that the red-hot Badgers of Valentine upset the home team Bassett Tigers. The visiting Valentine squad crossed the goal in the final quarter for the 6-0 conference decision that sprung the championship in the direction of O'Neill.

The Eagles will travel to Crofton this Friday for their sixth game of the season. The OHS Reserves lost to Neligh on Monday night 54-7. Freshman Larry




