Name Gotschall To Federal Trade Relations Post

Gale P. Gotschall, 44, formerly of Atkinson, has been appointed to serve as Consumer Relations Representative for the Commission.

Mr. Gotschall is the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Gotschall who reside on a ranch southwest of Atkinson.

The position of Consumer Relations Representative was created to meet a need for closer contact between the Commission and the consumer public, including various consumer groups. The Commission has broad responsibility to protect consumers from unfair and deceptive trade practices and a substantial portion of its efforts are directed towards the discharge of this responsibility.

Mr. Gotschall's duties will include keeping abreast of, and aiding in informing the public about the Commission's activities directly affecting consumers. He will obtain information from consumer groups and others for use by the Commission in determining what additional actions are required.

He will serve as liaison between the Commission and the President's Consumer Advisory Council and other consumer groups. Mr. Gotschall will perform his duties as Consumer Relations Representative from his present position as Assistant to the Director of the Commission's Bureau of Deceptive Practices.

Mr. Gotschall has been an outstanding attorney in the deceptive practices work of the Commission since graduating first in his class at the Washington (D.C.) College of Law and admission to the Bar in 1941. He was awarded Bachelor of Arts degree from George Washington University with distinction and with special honors in Economics.

He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa and the American and Federal Bar Associations. He served as lieutenant commander in the Officer Performance Division of the Navy Department during World War II. 4. No new plates for 1963 so add only 5c for postage. For new registrations which require new 1962 plates to be mailed add 25c. There will be three different color stickers for validating 1962 plates for 1963.

Red: Passenger cars and taxi.  
Blue: Commercial trucks and interstate buses.  
Yellow: Farm trucks, trailers, motorcycles, dealers and all others.
