BUSINESS ON THE BURLINGTON.

What the Road is Doing, the Effect of the Strike, Improvements, Etc.
Now, the great Burlington strike is over and local commerce generally has relapsed into its former channel of prosperity, a reporter in a few moments chat with city passenger agent Zeimer gained some information regarding things on the track of this continental highway.

"How is the strike now, Mr. Zeimer?" said the scribe. "Well, my friend, around here we know of no such thing as a strike and have not for several weeks. Our trains are running with the same punctuality as previous to the strike, and the fact that once in a great while a train is late has nothing to do with the present engineers, for by time they are fully acquainted with the road and understand their work equally as well as the old employees."

In answer to whether the strike has any effect on the business now, Mr. Zeimer replied: "Our business from and to Lincoln, was never better. Trains are always full and often times so full that we find it necessary to put our strongest engines on to pull them. We have two trains in the afternoon to Omaha—numbers 1 and 6, running about two hours apart; notwithstanding the short time between the two, both are nearly always crowded. You notice we had to attach an extra car to No. 2, to accommodate the past strike. This does not look as though the past strike is having a very disastrous effect on the company's business."
"How do you find travel generally, both east and west at this time and how does it compare with previous seasons?" was next asked. "My report for May, just finished shows that for that month this year, our business has been larger than last and the travel generally has been of a better class, there being more first class tickets sold, largely to settlers in this state and those going out were usually ticketed through to eastern points. The season of such increase in business this season is perhaps the round trip rates being offered by the company and the advertised attractions all over the country."
"I am told that the Burlington will soon put on a vestibule train service; have you had any advice about it yet?" "Well, nothing definite," was the railroad man's reply. "I am informed that our line will adopt the vestibule service, and are having the cars made especially, but when they will be out and run on the Chicago-Denver service is hard for me to say. However I can state that they will be as fine as the finest and as heretofore the Burlington will have nothing but the very best."
