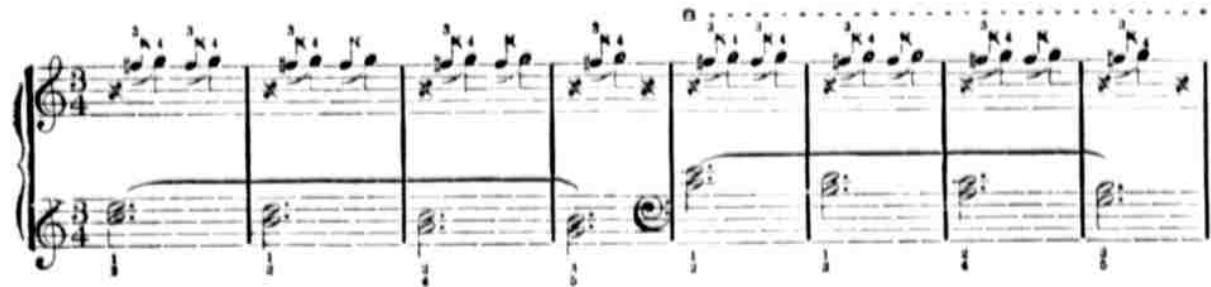

AMONG THE BOOK-MAKERS

CHOICE GEMS OF FRESH LITERATURE

Newspaper Notes from the World of Writers. New Books and Magazines.

"The adventures of a Chinaman in China, from the French of Jules Verne, in new edition, has been published by Lee & Shepard, Boston. The book has fifty illustrations, and portrays the tribulations of a Chinaman in China, and the reader is permitted "without fatigue" to "glance over the City of Shanghai" and "without fatigue" to "travel through four cities by visiting only one," and to follow Kim-fo and his friends, all philosophers, in their various experiences and adventures in the "Flowery Kingdom." Jules Verne's writings are full of charm, and this translation by Virginia Champin will bring this author into renewed popularity. The description of towns and economies are reliable and instructive, and the book abounds in the keenest sort of narratives, which are sure to bring forth a hearty laugh. There are no dull lines in this volume, for the author's imagination, stock of scientific and historical information, wit, sarcasm and ability as a story teller, all play important parts in making a delightful book.

The brilliant author of the much-admired "Curfew Must Not Ring Tonight"—Rose Hartwick Thorpe—has written a grand collection of stories, in prose and in verse, for young people, well illustrated, with the title of "The Year's Best Days." Now Year's Day, St. Valentine's Day, April Fool's Day, Easter Day, Thanksgiving Day, etc., etc., are the days around which cluster memories of various kinds; and the associations connected with the year's best days, are full of interest and charm. These are no dull lines in this volume, for the author's imagination, stock of scientific and historical information, wit, sarcasm and ability as a story teller, all play important parts in making a delightful book.

The great feature of the *Book Buyer* for November is the specially engraved portrait of Mrs. Humphrey Ward, the author of that remarkable book, "Robert Elsmere." The portrait is one of the most interesting of the series of famous authors which the *Book Buyer* is printing from month to month, and will excite wide attention, as this is the first opportunity that the multitude of people who have read her book have had to study the striking features of this talented lady. The portrait is accompanied by a sketch of Mrs. Ward, in which her personal history and literary career are fully and, for the first time, authoritatively described. Another interesting article in this number is a sketch of Mrs. Margaret Deland, of Boston, author of the

"John Ward, Preacher," which is also accompanied by a portrait. The announcement of the Christmas *Book Buyer* holds out a promise of a multitude of good things—a special Christmas article by Donald G. Mitchell—"The Marvel" a Christmas poem by James Whitcomb Riley, and special reviews of the principal holiday books by Sarah Orne Jewett, Octave Thanet, Mrs. Burton Harrison, George Parsons Lathrop, Rossiter Johnson, Hamilton W. Mabie, W. C. Brownell, Prof. James Baldwin and others. The number will have over fifty illustrations from the holiday books and many of them will be printed in color. The usual departments of the present number—the Boston and London correspondence, the reviews of new books, with many illustrations, readings from new books, and the answers to literary queries—are as entertaining as usual. A fine of booklets published by Lee & Shepard, Boston, for the evening holiday trade, is styled "Art Scale Souvenirs," this title being given to the booklets because of the handsome floral ornaments with which the covers are embellished.

The booklet contains an original holiday poem by Mrs. Whiton Stone, entitled "It is Christmas Day," printed on heavy Bristol board, and bound in a pretty decorated cover, the elegant design of which is the "art scale" flower ornament. These flowers are perfect imitations of pansies, hollyhocks, daisies, sweet peas, forget-me-nots and violets, form and color being faithfully reproduced, the material with which they are made being scales from the flax of southern seas. The reviewer is fortunate in these "art scale" flowers is Miss Mary Elizabeth Parker, with whom Lee & Shepard have made arrangements for the use of them as ever decorations for the embellishment of these special booklets.

The contents of the December *Outing* are highly attractive and seasonable. Besides the leading article, "Sport, Past, Present and Future," the two articles, "The Detroit Athletic Club" and "American College Athletics," and Mr. Foley's "Outdoor Life of the Presidents," we notice "Flicker Shooting on the Marshes," by G. W. Hart; the concluding installment of Ernest Ingersoll's "To the Pacific Through Canada, a Critical Statement," by S. Smith, an interesting story of journalistic life, "A Visit to Death Lake, Florida," by Lieut. W. R. Hamilton, an account of a curious adventure, "A Ride to a Russian We-Hing," by C. M. Litwin, which tells of an exciting race against time, "The Ladies' Eastern Bicycle Tour," by "Daisy," and some poems of more than ordinary excellence, including "A Love Letter," by Frank Dumasters Sherman. The regular Editorial Departments and Records are in their usual good shape and give much seasonable information.

Seaside's Magazine completes its second year and fourth volume with a Christmas number containing nineteen interesting articles in prose and verse—twelve of them fully illustrated by well-known artists and engravers. Among the artists represented are Elihu Vedder, J. Alden Weir, W. Hamilton Gibson, John LaFarge, Robert Blum, George Hitchcock, C. J. Taylor and M. J. Burns. The number is rich in beautiful decorations and pictures. The literature deals with un-

usually attractive phases of life and art especially fitted for the Christmas season. The fiction includes stories of adventure and sentiment; the general articles treat of stained-glass windows, the Adirondacks in winter, and Bonticelli; there are several elaborately illustrated poems, and Lester Wallack's reminiscences are concluded. Robert Louis Stevenson, H. C. Sumner, Will H. Low, Rebecca Harding Davis, and a Milton Wright Mabie are among the contributors.

With the closing of the year, *Godey's Lady's Book* issues a superb number, running over with seasonable attractions of the most brilliant kind. The exquisite steel-plate frontispiece, "The Parting Promise," illustrates a capital story, by Max Vander Weyde, Emily Lennox's illustrated story, "Reggy Did It," is a gem in its way. So is Emily Road's "Stratagem." "Inasmuch" is very touching. "A Woman's Way" will be greatly enjoyed.

Farwell, upon the northwest quarter of section numbered twenty-six, 26, in township numbered seven 7, north of range numbered five 5, east of the 6th E. M., in Lancaster county, Nebraska, to secure the payment of two certain promissory notes, dated January 1, 1887, one for the sum of \$1000 and the other for the sum of \$500, the latter falling due January 1, 1888, and the former January 1, 1889, with annual interest at 8 per cent per annum on each, and that there is now due and payable and due on said notes the sum of \$2,250.00, for which sum the plaintiff prays for a decree that defendants be required to pay the same, or that said premises may be sold to satisfy the amount found due.
