SHORTHAND IN TEN LESSON III.

If you meet with any difficulty, or if you do not find short-hand clear and easy at the start, do not for that reason throw down your pen. You can afford to be patient. Do not be overly anxious about the next lesson. It will come soon enough. Meanwhile learn this one still better. Study, write, read, practice, work away.

Speed in short-hand is of no consequence unless what is written can be read. Legibility, or readability, depends in part upon the accurate forming of the characters. To do this it is not necessary to write them slowly, on the contrary experienced stenographers produce the most perfect outlines with a somewhat rapid movement, just as an experienced penman executes the most graceful curves by a quick stroke, rather than by slowly drawing it.

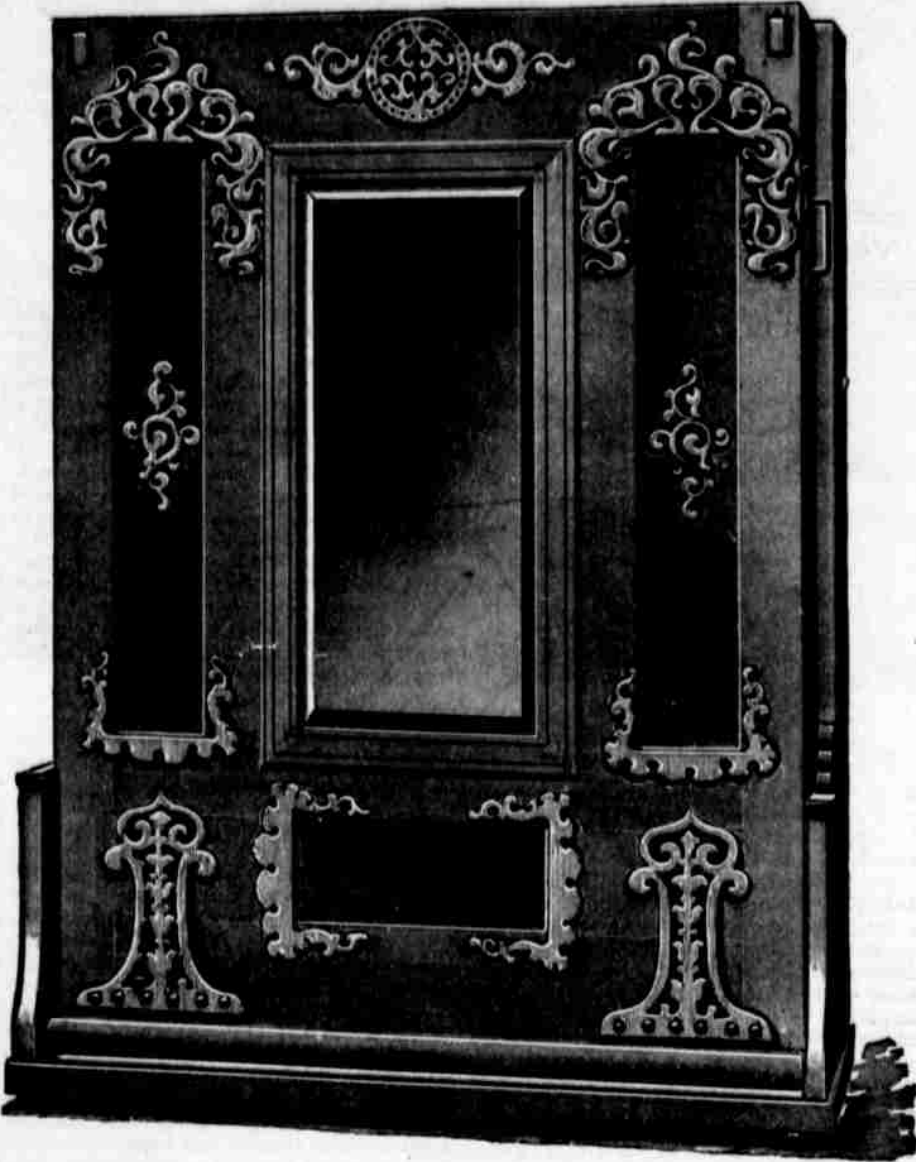
