

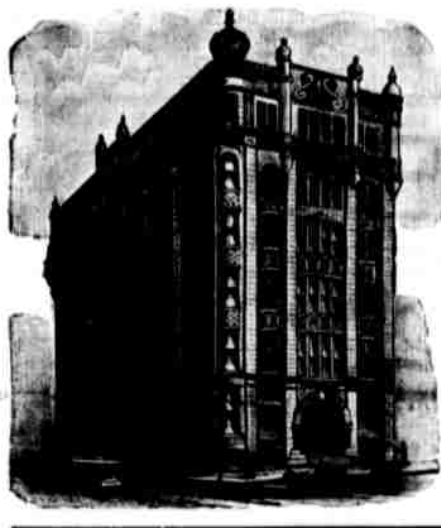

## NEW OUTDOOR TOILETTES.

New York, Oct. 23, 1890.—Long ago it was said that "the making of books there is no end," and the same might now be affirmed of gowns.—that is, so far as the great Redfern establishment in New York is concerned. And especially is this the case at this time of the year when the fashionable 400 are returning from their sojourn at their country homes with worn and dragged plumage, which must at once be replaced by the latest reasonable costumes, so that from early morning till after sunset, there is no rest for the army of employees whose combined efforts go to the making of these elegant garments, gowns, hats and confection which have made the Redfern name a household word all over the civilized world.  
In this issue of THE COURIER we shall endeavor to give our readers an idea of the newest designs in gowns, suitable for mid-autumn wear.



The first cut represents "a street costume of forest cloth" in a medium shade of aufergine, a reddish, egg-plant purple, with more depth than petunia or dahlia. Upon the skirt which has a slight panier drapery, is a hand-some design in black velvet outlined with silver braid. This extends above the knee, and is in separate motifs, separated by lengthwise bands of wide black braid, also edged with silver. The cuffs are of velvet and the ends of the back drapery hang in burnous folds to show a velvet lining. The bodice has lengthwise, graduated rows of the braid to correspond with the skirt and a narrow band of black fox encircles the throat, above the high collar.



A REDFERRY WALKING GOWN, is shown in our second sketch. It has a skirt of darkest brown velvet, trimmed with an

applied design in velvet a shade or two lighter, with which is an admixture of tinsel cord. The bodice and draperies are of fawn colored cloth, with a facing of fawn and gold cords over insertions of the velvet, which are bordered each side by narrow rolled bands of natural seal. The velvet collar is also headed by a roll of the fur, and the hat is of fawn cloth braided with gold and of brown velvet, with ostrich trimming.
