**OF JACKETS AND WRAPS.**

**OLIVE HARPER WRITES OF SEASONABLE OUTSIDE GARMENTS.**

It's the Style to Cover Your Jackets with Buttons That Are Called "Nail Heads." Detailed Description of the Newest Things Out, Accompanied with Cuts.

NEW YORK, May 27.—Some of the new spring and early summer capes have a look of being studded with great nails, like a steamboat boiler, and other kinds of nails as well. In fact, the jetted and many faceted buttons are called "nail heads." One style of cape has a sort of V shaped portion down the back and front, and the rest is plaited in at the shoulders or gathered. The back and front are covered with these great nail head buttons, and the high collar is also closely studded with them. Some other styles have a richly braided round yoke, on which the material is gathered, and around the bottom are sewn two or three rows of these nail heads. They are about an inch and a half in diameter, and nearly always black, and, put upon the very light colored cloths in use for this style of wrap, the contrast is very striking.

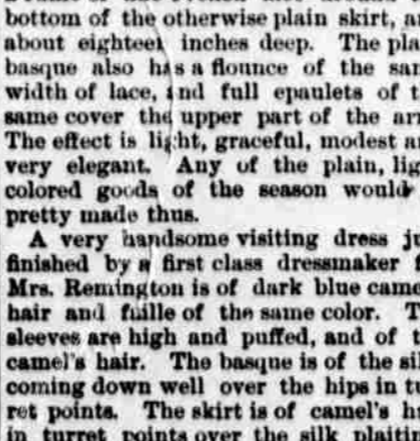
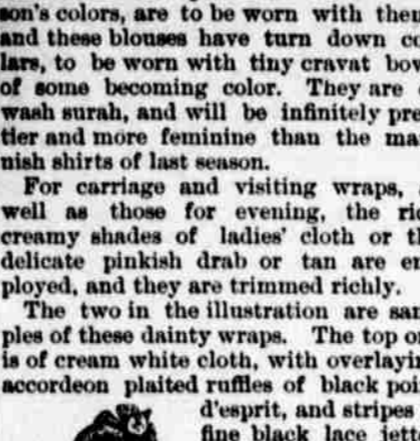
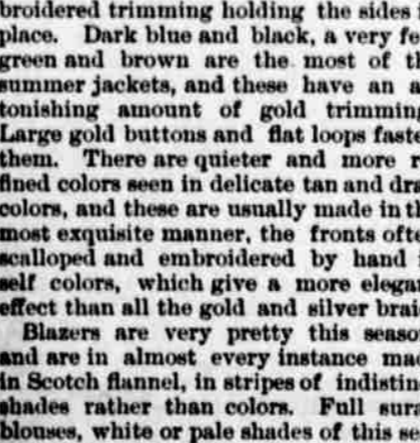
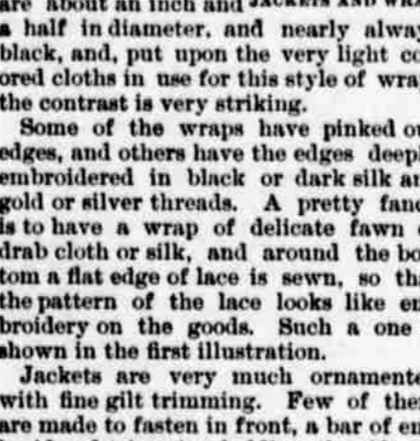
Some of the wraps have pinked out edges, and others have the edges deeply embroidered in black or dark silk and gold or silver threads. A pretty fancy is to have a wrap of delicate fawn or drab cloth or silk, and around the bottom a flat edge of lace is sewn, so that the pattern of the lace looks like embroidery on the goods. Such a one is shown in the first illustration.

Jackets are very much ornamented with fine gilt trimming. Few of them are made to fasten in front, a bar of embroidered trimming holding the sides in place. Dark blue and black, a very few green and brown are the most of the summer jackets, and these have an astonishing amount of gold trimming. Large gold buttons and flat loops fasten them. There are quieter and more refined colors seen in delicate tan and drab colors, and these are usually made in the most exquisite manner, the fronts often scalloped and embroidered by hand in self colors, which give a more elegant effect than all the gold and silver braid.

Blazers are very pretty this season, and are in almost every instance made in Scotch flannel, in stripes of indistinct shades rather than colors. Full surah blouses, white or pale shades of this season's colors, are to be worn with them, and these blouses have turn down collars, to be worn with tiny cravat bows of some becoming color. They are of wash surah, and will be infinitely prettier and more feminine than the manish shirts of last season.

For carriage and visiting wraps, as well as those for evening, the rich creamy shades of ladies' cloth or the delicate pinkish drab or tan are employed, and they are trimmed richly.

The two in the illustration are samples of these dainty wraps. The top one is of cream white cloth, with overlying accordeon plaited ruffles of black point d'esprit, and stripes of fine black lace jetted with fine cut beads are placed lengthwise upon it. The Tudor collar is a mass of
