Second Day's Proceedings.

MORNING SESSION.

Grand Lodge opened in due form, W. C. T. Minick in the chair.

Minutes of first day's afternoon session read and approved.

The secretary, Committee's report showed the gross receipts for the past year were \$1,696.81.

One year ago the indebtedness was something over \$1,400; this year the entire indebtedness is \$501.83, which will soon be paid off.

The finance committee recommended that all warrants be paid according to their numbers, the lowest number first.

This was unanimously adopted.

The office of G. W. C. T. was made honorary.

The salary of the G. W. secretary, was fixed at \$175 for the coming year.

The per capita tax was fixed at fifteen cents per year.

J. Bacon, G. W. D. M., Nellie White; G. W. A. S., John Maxwell; O. G., John Devins.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

At 1:30 p. m. the Grand Lodge opened in due form, G. W. C. T. Minick in the chair.

The following of the G. W. S. and G. W. T. in the sum of \$4,000 each, were approved, after which the following officers were duly installed:

The basis of representation was changed so as to read, one representative for forty members or fraction thereof.

F. W. Keens, R. W. G. S., reported the following resolution: That the G. W. C. T. be refused to commission deputies from among the Scandinavian population with the view of spreading Good Templarism in the State of Nebraska, and the same was adopted.

An impromptu collection amounting to \$10 was taken up for the purpose of purchasing Richardson's Temperance lesson book, with a view of introducing them into the public schools of the State.

Bell. G. Bigelow offered the following preamble and resolution which were unanimously adopted:

Whereas, It has pleased our Father in Heaven to remove from time to eternity, Sister Emma Pardee South, who died of consumption Sept. 6th 1882, at her home in St. Edwards, Nebraska, and

Whereas, As Sister Smith was a member of the Grand Lodge, a sister in the early morning of life has passed to that temple above. Therefore be it

Resolved, That we as a body express by a rising vote our sorrow for the loss of a worthy member of our order, one that was always a ready and willing advocate of the cause of temperance.

Resolved that a page be set apart in our journal appropriately decorated, and these resolutions be engrossed thereon. That the G. W. S. be instructed to forward a copy of this preamble and resolutions to the family of our deceased sister.

A number of questions were asked and answered by the G. W. S.

Anna M. Sanders in a few well chosen words presented Father Earnshaw a purse containing \$20, as a token of affection and esteem, to which he feelingly responded. He stated that he had been a member of his Grand Lodge for sixteen years, and this token would brighten the declining years of his life.

F. W. Keens, R. W. G. S., exemplified the unwritten work of the order.

After the reading of the afternoon journal the Grand Lodge adjourned sine die, to meet at Crete, Saline county, at 10 o'clock.

What the Inter Ocean has predicted ever since Frank James surrendered to the governor of Missouri is coming to pass, and it is that his favorite son of Missouri will not be ranged much longer by the restraints of the law. It has been discovered that he is not guilty of murder, and he is officially relieved from the odium of that crime, and held to await trial for the charge of robbery.

He needs but little time and effort to vindicate him from this vile slander, and then he will be "as free as the air he breathes," which is said to be a favorite condition of the bandit.

When the authorities of Missouri are through with Mr. James, the authorities of Minnesota should pay him some attention and probably will. He needs that state but once, and then under circumstances that somewhat interfered with his enjoyment. He got a bank cashier who refused to give up the combination that would open the vault, but aroused a different class of people than those he was accustomed to in Missouri, and had the "forest call" of his life. Two of his horses were killed, three were captured and sent to the penitentiary for larceny, the law did not tolerate hangings, and he, with his brother Jesse, escaped after a desperate flight of 90 miles through Minnesota, Iowa and Nebraska. Mr. James' associates in this adventure were easily convicted and sentenced to the heaviest penalty known to the statutes of Minnesota.
