WRITTEN TO AN AMERICAN CITIZEN.

The British Ambassador Endorses Cleveland as the English Candidate.

BEAVERLY, MASS., Sept. 13, 1888.

SIR—I am in receipt of your letter of the 4th inst., and beg to say that I fully appreciate the difficulty in which you find yourself in casting your vote. You are probably aware that any political party which openly favored the mother country at the present moment would lose popularity, and that the party in power is fully aware of this fact.
