Dr. Winterstein opened an office at Lockport where he practiced medicine. In 1858 he removed to Marietta, Iowa. where he established an enviable reputation as a physician. In 1865 he came to Plattsmouth. He purchased property here and up to the time of his death devoted himself to looking after his monetary interests having entirely given up the labors of a practicing physician. Dr. Winterstein was well liked and had a host of friends who mourns his loss which to the public came without a moments varning. He was a good noble hearted man and his genial presence will be greatly missed in this city.
