A Magnetle Separator,

Among the numerous magnetic separators one of the most remarkable is that for the extraction of iron from the sea sand. It is stated that ordinary sea sand contains from 5 to 7 per cent. of iron, enough to give a large excess over cost of extraction. The machine consists of a cylinder, whose surface is composed of electro-magnets, revolving on the inside of an emiless canvas belt. The sand is rates the particles, the iron being retained by the powerful electro-magnets and carried off on the belt to a recepta cle at the other end, while the sand falls into the trough below. - Exchange.
